Make sure you <u>always</u> refer to the legal rules and case law relevant for your answer.

Solving the Cases¹

The exam will be based on, among others, solving cases. Each case consists of legal questions that have to be answered. An answer could be formulated by using the IRAC-method, which will help one structuring it.

1. Issue

Firstly, the problem statement of this particular case should be formulated. For this, one can mention the relevant case facts, necessary for answering the question.

2. Rule

Secondly, based on the specific issue mentioned, the legislation or case law applicable should be mentioned. The legal rules laid down are mostly interpreted in case law, therefore the availability of both must be checked and referred to.

3. Apply

Thirdly, in order to solve the case, the legal rules (and case law) should be applied to the issue.

For example, explain whether the criteria of a certain legal rule are fulfilled in this specific case and check this in the light of the interpretation of the legal rule or criteria laid down in case law.

4. Conclusion

Lastly, a conclusive and concrete answer to the question must be formulated.
