## 1. Housing

Your priority is getting a private and personal Dutch address. As this is an absolute necessity to register in the municipality, open a bank account, and meet other obligations, we strongly recommend arranging this as soon as possible. Postponing this until you have arrived in the Netherlands jeopardizes your financial mobility, legal residence, timely start of the program, etc. Finding suitable accommodation after you have arrived is extremely difficult and the address of a hotel, a friend, or the university is not acceptable. A good place to start is the [Maastricht Housing \(link\)](#) website.

**Note that holders of a Dutch residence permit are not allowed to live outside the Netherlands unless they also have a residence permit for the other country.**

**Housing in Maastricht**  
**House Hunting: Start early!**

Starting your house hunt early is essential. Housing options in Maastricht are severely limited, especially at the start of the academic year. Therefore, we strongly advise you not to come to Maastricht if you have not found housing in or around the city before the academic year begins.

If you arrive without housing arrangements, please be aware that UM doesn't provide student housing and online education isn't available due to housing constraints.

Exercise caution with Facebook housing offers and always inspect rooms in person. Non-EU students should note that their Dutch student visa requires residency in the Netherlands, so living in a nearby country on this visa is not an option.

## 2. Crucial documents

The following documents are crucial to bring with you and therefore arrange in time:

- A legalized birth certificate: this is compulsory for your municipal registration. Depending on your nationality, the legalization process may be very different and take a lot of time. For more information on legalization, please consult the Dutch government's [legalization page \(link\)](#).
- Your valid passport (including the MVV visa sticker)
- The health insurance policy

## 3. Health insurance

If you do not have health insurance yet, or if your current insurance policy does not (sufficiently) cover your stay in the Netherlands, you have to take out health insurance before traveling to the Netherlands or immediately upon arrival. ## 4. Money

Since cash payments in the Netherlands are getting less and less and paying by credit card is not always possible, you may want to consider the following. You can open an online bank account without the need for a social security number (BSN) to have quick access to your money and make payments easily. ## 5. Travel

Do not travel to the Netherlands until your MVV visa has been issued and validated at the Dutch embassy. To avoid travel issues, we strongly recommend consulting [this website \(link\)](#) on the most current requirements.

## And after the official decision letter is received?

As soon as the decision on the residence permit application is received, we will inform you on the following items:

1. Biometrics
2. Arrange travel on arrival
3. Collection of the residence permit and municipal registration
4. Subject to a TB test (if applicable)
5. Opening a Dutch bank account
6. Getting your deposit back
